Objective

Develop basic skills for describing a person you know or a person you would like to know more about.

Introduction

Writing is not easy. But when you write about something you know a lot about, it is easier. In this unit, you will read about some famous people you probably already know something about. You can use words and grammatical expressions from the reading to help you write about these or other people. So, as you read, notice those descriptions that tell you how a person looks, how a person acts, or what kind of a person he or she is. Specifically, pay attention to the key words or grammatical patterns that describe the person. Now you are ready to start writing!

From Reading to Writing

Reading Selection 1

Chen Shu-chu: An Unsung Heroine

The world is full of unsung heroes and heroines. They never become rich and famous. They never appear in newspaper headlines or do celebrity interviews on TV. But they make the world a better place for all of us. Such a person is Chen Shu-chu.

If you saw Chen Shu-chu selling vegetables in Taitung's central market, you might not pay any special attention to her. That's because she is a very ordinary-looking person who is more than 60 years of age. She is the kind of seller who wears an apron while working in her stall. Her straight black hair is pulled back in a practical way behind her head. She seldom smiles and doesn't talk much. It is clear that she is an efficient businesswoman. She works seven days a week, from early morning to night.

If you ask Chen why she works so hard and is so thrifty, you might be surprised at the answer. She says in her modest way that she uses the money she makes by selling vegetables to help others. In fact, in recent years, Chen

has donated more than NT\$10 million to worthy causes. She has helped build a library at the elementary school she once attended. She also supports a local orphanage and gives financial support to needy children.

Perhaps it is Chen's early life which helps explain how she has become the kind of person she is today. She grew up in poverty and hardship. She came from a large family and had six siblings to support. She never got married. Instead, she chose to live a life of service to others. It is for



this reason that *TIME* magazine in 2010 chose Chen Shu-chu as one of the 100 people who most affect our world today. *Reader's Digest* also honored her as the winner of its 2010 Asian of the Year Award.

But Chen denies that she is a heroine. She merely says that money serves its purpose only when it is used for those who need it. In her own humble way, Chen is a very wonderful and extraordinary person indeed.

Steve Jobs: The Man with a Vision

Did you ever watch Steve Jobs on television introducing a new Apple product? He was a tall, thin man who dressed very casually. He often wore blue jeans. He usually had a neat, dark beard. There was a sincere, even intense, look in his eyes as he enthusiastically described all the wonders Apple's newest electronic device could perform.

As you watched Jobs, you saw a man who was in love with what he did. He had both imagination and vision. This had been true from a very early age. Jobs had served as a summer intern at Hewlett-Packard while still in high school. He had dropped out of college to follow his own curiosity. When he was only 21, he and a friend started the business that became one of the most famous and successful of all modern companies. Jobs called his new company Apple, which was the fruit that he often liked to eat.

As his career developed, Jobs became something of a legend. The people who worked for him sometimes called him "stubborn" and "demanding." He was a perfectionist. He was not easy to get along with. Others praised him for being "passionate" and "idealistic." What was always clear was that he was a man who listened to his own voice, lived his own way, and followed his own dream.

While speaking to the graduating class of Stanford University in 2005, Jobs concluded with this advice: "Stay hungry. Stay foolish." Jobs meant that we should always be hungry for knowledge and be willing to appear foolish in our search for truth.

Steve Jobs died in 2011 at the age of 56. Some of the special character and vision that had made Apple a leader in the field of high technology seemed to die with him. Who will be the next Steve Jobs, and what kind of company will he or she lead? Only time will tell.

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



Capitalization and Punctuation

A. Beginning and Ending a Sentence

A sentence begins with a capital letter (A, B, C...) and ends with a punctuation mark. The punctuation mark can be a period (.), a question mark (?), or an exclamation mark (!).

- **Examples** 1. Whitney Houston was one of the best singers in the 1990s.
 - 2. Do you agree that Whitney Houston was one of the best singers in the 1990s?
 - 3. What a great singer Whitney Houston was in the 1990s!

B. Additional Punctuation Mark—Commas (,)
